Room in the Inn – Memphis is a ministry involving over 50 faith-based organizations in the Memphis area. "Serving people of RITI is experiencing mission homelessness in a safe environment of hospitality." RITI provides emergency winter shelter for men and women. The program operates from November 1 through March 31, seven nights a week. Guests are transported to locations throughout the area. Transportation to the various locations, staffing and meals are provided by volunteers. Farmington provides these resources to RITI at the Germantown UMC location two Saturdays per month. This is Farmington's fifth year to participate in the program.

The generous \$300 grant that Farmington PW received from the Presbytery of the Mid-South Together-In-Service Award was used to purchase new sheets, pillowcases and pillows. The goal is always to make our guests feel special when they are with us. The new linens certainly helped us achieve that purpose.



PRESBYTERY OF THE MID-SOUTH CALLS NEW EXECUTIVE PRESBYTER

After a year long search involving over 30 candidates from both coasts and the heartland of our country, The Presbytery of the Mid-South has called The Reverend James Luther Gale, Jr., former Associate Executive Presbyter for the Synod of Mid America, to be the Executive Presbyter of the Presbytery of the Mid-South. The Executive Presbyter Nominating Committee narrowed the field to five candidates and called Rev. Gale because of his outstanding credentials and impressive abilities. Rev. Gale told the Presbytery, "I feel called to mid-council ministry, working to equip and prepare leaders for the rapidly changing future. "

James brings extensive experience from his role working with six presbyteries in the Synod of Mid America. "James has the exceptional ability to identify issues that are of primary concern, then help people to focus and find solutions for that issue. He is adept at identifying people to work alongside with and develop teams to strategically and effectively achieve goals," said The Reverend Jason Carle, Pastor of Overland Park Presbyterian Church, Overland Park, KS.

Ruling Elder James Rissler, Chief Executive Officer Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program describes James as a "very good listener and a good sounding board. He is straight forward and asks good questions. He gets to the heart of the matter quickly. He is a quick study and is energized by challenges. The church is the heart of everything he does."

Rev. Gale is excited about the opportunity to work with The Presbytery of the Mid-South. He was called with a unanimous vote of our Presbytery. James and his family, The Reverend Mary Newberg Gale who is currently the Associate Pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Lawrence, Kansas, and their daughters, Ainsley (11) and Fiona (6). James served as Director of Operations and Program Assistant for Synod of Mid-America. He earned a Certificate of Executive Leadership at McCormick Seminary, graduated with a Masters of Divinity, Columbia Theological Seminary and has served as Faculty, Mid-America Lincoln Trails Interim Training (MALT). Let us join with members of our Presbytery to pray for James, Mary, Ainslie and Fiona as they prepare to move to the Mid-South.

CHURCH CHOIRS

In October and November, we began a series on the functions of the church choir. This month, we add the third function:

- 1. The church choir leads and enlivens the congregation's song
- 2. The church choir sings music that the congregation cannot

3. THE CHURCH CHOIR SERVES AS A SMALL-GROUP WITHIN THE CHURCH FOR FAITH FORMATION

Because we meet together once a week to do work for the glory of God and benefit of neighbor, taking care of each other is no longer an option, it's a responsibility. It means that we are charged with ensuring the choir enacts the words we sing each week in worship. A great example of this is the familiar Latin text "Ubi Caritas," something that most church choirs have sung at one time or another:

"Where charity and love are, God is there. Christ's love has gathered us into one. Let us rejoice and be pleased in Him. Let us fear, and let us love the living God. And may we love each other with a sincere heart."

THE HISTORY OF

Lessons & Carols

On 20 May 1880, the Prince of Wales and Duke of Cornwall laid the foundation stones of Truro Cathedral amid great pomp and circumstance. For Christmas Eve that year, Edward White Benson, the first Bishop of Truro, devised a new service: the Nine Lessons with Carols. Taking nine biblical passages from the old and new testaments he interspersed them with various carols, and hymns to tell the Christmas story. The service began by setting out mankind's need for a Redeemer – the first "lesson" recounting Adam's "original sin" in eating an apple from the tree from which God has commanded him not to eat. The account of Jesus's birth is from St Luke's gospel. And the final readings focus on what that birth means for us. Benson also decided that the first reader should be a humble chorister, each subsequent one progressing through the cathedral hierarchy up to the bishop, a tradition that continues to this day.

The Nine Lessons with Carols service was an immediate success. Truro's citizens packed into the temporary wooden shed that stood as their cathedral for seven years while their new cathedral was constructed. Not only was it a satisfying format theologically and liturgically, it was also a vehicle for bringing the community together at an unsettling time, as they awaited the birth of their new cathedral.

The service quickly travelled beyond Cornwall, but it was Cambridge's King's College, with its celebrated choir, that really put it on the map. Eric Milner-White, Dean of King's, took up the service in 1918 with a few changes. The service is just as popular today as ever and continues to evolve in the readings chosen and the music heard.

SESSION REPORT

Session welcomed Bonnie Algee to share information about the Presbytery's College Ministry, "UKirk." In addition, funds were approved for Doug to enroll in "Faith and Human Development" which is the final course toward him being recognized as a Certified Christian Educator.

Session was excited to welcome Leslie McNamara as a member of the Farmington family by Transfer of Letter from Germantown United Methodist Church.

02

MAKE J-O-Y PERSONAL.

Name something that starts with a J, O, then Y that brings you joy.

03

Mary is greatly troubled when she hears the angel's greeting.

DONATE SOMETHING. Bring JOY to a family in need by gathering your gently-used coats and gloves to drop off at a charity.

04

Gabriel responds to Mary: "Don't be afraid; God is very happy with you!"

LAUGH OUT LOUD. Share your favorite jokes or hilarious YouTube videos with each other.

05

Gabriel tells Mary the special news: She will have a baby boy, and He will be named Jesus.

SERVE TOGETHER. Serving together not only helps others but is life-giving to your family. Choose one way you can volunteer your time as a family this month.

06

Gabriel shares more details of God's plan with Mary: "Jesus will be great and will be called God's very own son!"

HAVE A DANCE PARTY. Create some family joy by turning on your favorite Christmas music and having a dance party. 07

Mary doesn't understand how she can have a baby without being married, but the angel Gabriel assures her of a great truth: Nothing is impossible with God.

BE CREATIVE. Use your talents (whatever they are) to create something that represents the story of the birth of Jesus-like a Christmas ornament, a painting, a rap, a short play.

08

"I serve God with my life and want all that you have said to happen," Mary tells the angel, and he leaves.

POWER DOWN. Too much technology can steal your joy. So turn it off for an undistracted evening together. Bake Christmas cookies, talk about your favorite Christmas memory, or plan a Christmas surprise for another family.

09

Mary visits her cousin Elizabeth and is so overwhelmed with God's goodness that she sings a song of praise.

HAVE A MOVIE NIGHT. Snuggle up and watch your favorite Christmas movie together.

10

Caesar Augustus wants to know how many people are in his empire, so he tells all the people to go back to their nometown to be registered and counted.

ORGANIZE SOMETHING. Declutter and give away no longer used items, like clothes that don't fit or toys that are no longer played with, to a local charity.

Joseph takes Mary, who is pregnant, to his hometown of Bethlehem to be counted.

START A NEW CHRISTMAS

TRADITION. Google search Christmas traditions around the world and have your family vote on a new one to adopt.

While Joseph and Mary are in Bethlehem, the time comes for the baby to be born.

SPEND TIME WITH FAMILY AND FRIENDS. Invite a few of your favorite people over for dessert or a game night. 13

Mary gives birth to Jesus, wraps Him in swaddling cloths and lays Him in a manger because there is no room for them anywhere else.

GIVE THE GIFT OF READING. Give the joy of reading by collecting gently-used books and dropping them off at your local Goodwill or public library.

At night in a nearby field, shepherds are watching their flocks.

DITCH COMPLAINTS. Complaining is the opposite of joy. This week, every time you complain, follow it up by saying one thing you're thankful for.

15

The sky lights up-God has sent an angel to the shepherds to tell them the good news.

FIND JOYFUL PEOPLE. Have everyone answer–the most joyful person I know is _____.

Discuss why you think so.

16

When the shepherds see the angel, they're afraid!

SMILE. Take your smile everywhere you go today. Even a simple smile can bring joy to someone having a rough day.

17

The angel tries to calm the shepherds: "Don't be afraid-I bring wonderful news that will bring joy to all of the world!"

LEAVE GOODIES. Bring joy to your neighbors by leaving a small gift or goody on a few doorsteps with an encouraging note.

18

"A Savior-the Rescuer you have been waiting for is born today!" the angel proclaims to the shepherds.

GIVE COMPLIMENTS. See how many compliments each of you can give to brighten someone else's day today.

19

The angel explains that the shepherds will find the baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger.

LOOK FOR JOY. Discuss: "How can we be joyful when we feel unhappy?"

20

More angels come to celebrate the good news-they arrive at the shepherd's field and begin praising God!

TAKE A BREATHER. Declare today (as much as possible) an "off day." Stay in pajamas. Leave the dishes in the sink. Put off the wrapping one more evening. 21

The shepherds leave their flocks and hurry to find Mary, Joseph, and the baby, who is lying in a manger.

CHECK-IN. Have each person share the most joyful part of their day today.

22

After they see the baby, the shepherds excitedly go and tell everyone they run into the good news!

BE THANKFUL. Write a note or card thanking someone who has brought you joy recently.

23

The shepherds return to their flocks, praising God for all they had seen and heard.

ENJOY THE LIGHTS. Christmas decorations bring holiday joy! Take a drive or walk around your community and enjoy the bright, beautiful colors.

24

Mary names the baby Jesus just as the angel had told her to do.

GO DOWN MEMORY LANE. Pull out old family albums or scroll through old Christmas pictures. Tell stories of your favorite Christmases and memories.

25

God has sent His Son to rescue us because He loves us so very much!

JESUS IS BORN! Read the story of Jesus' birth from Luke 1:26–2:21 and remember the greatest joy of all–hope in our Savior, Jesus!
