Dear Farmington Family,

I will miss the Annual Bake Sale that was supposed to happen April 1st, and I grieve the uncertainty of summer church camp at Pinecrest. I will miss the Rise Against Hunger packaging event that would have packaged 20,000 meals on April 26th, and I grieve that there are only 3 weeks of food left to distribute to their partner organizations to feed children in developing countries.

As I consider the things that would have happened at Farmington Presbyterian in April, I am reminded of the critical ways we are Jesus's hands and feet in the world. One Great Hour of Sharing is one of our four denominational offerings each year. Farmington Presbyterian traditionally receives this offering on Palm Sunday. In Isaiah 58. God issues a call and a challenge-to love one another more deeply by sharing what we have with those in need. Together, we become the household of God where those seeking shelter, food and renewed hope are welcome. Received during the season of Lent, One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) is the single, largest way that Presbyterians come together every year to build God's household and welcome our neighbors-in need around the world bv providing relief from natural disasters, food for the hungry, and support for the poor and oppressed.

Each gift to OGHS helps to improve the lives of people in challenging situations through three impactful programs:

PRESBYTERIAN ASSISTANCE :

DISASTER

Works alongside communities as they recover and find hope after the devastation of natural or human-caused disasters

PRESBYTERIAN HUNGER PROGRAM :

Takes action to alleviate hunger and the systemic causes of poverty so all may be fed.

SELF-DEVELOPMENT OF PEOPLE :

Invests in communities responding to their experiences of racism, oppression, poverty and injustice and educates Presbyterians about the impact of these societal ills

Through One Great Hour of Sharing, we become the household of God. We extend shelter to those who have no place to stay, offer compassion to those who have pain—be it physical, emotional or spiritual—and we set a feast, with God, for those who lack access to enough food to eat. God's household filled with love and everyone is welcome.

God's Word for Our Time

"I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us. For the creation waits in eager expectation for the children of God to be revealed. For the creation was subjected to frustration, not by its own choice, but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the freedom and glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time. Not only so, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for our adoption to sonship, the redemption of our bodies. For in this hope we were saved. But hope that is seen is no hope at all. Who hopes for what they already have? But if we hope for what we do not yet have, we wait for it patiently.

In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans. And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for God's people in accordance with the will of God.

And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose."


The End of the World?

The CARES Act & Your Taxes

The CARES Act, passed to alleviate some of the financial hardship experienced across our nation as a result of Covid-19 includes some important tax information related to your gifts to the church and other charitable organizations. As always, please see your tax advisor for more information and advice specific to your situation.

Here are the highlights:

IF YOU DO NOT ITEMIZE, the CARES Act allows an individual to make a cash contribution up to \$300 and deduct the contribution "above the line" when computing adjusted gross income.

This means the taxpayer will receive this deduction in addition to their standard deduction.

IF YOU DO ITEMIZE, the new law temporarily lifts the limits on charitable giving for 2020.

Cash contributions can be deducted up to 100% of adjusted gross income for 2020 (normally limited to 60%).

Excess contributions can be carried over to the next five years.

Corporate donors will be able to deduct donations totaling 25% of adjusted taxable income (normally 10%).
