Deepening Our Discipleship

Who are you? Why do you exist? There is no more important question for human beings than "What is the meaning of life?" So, it makes sense that catechisms begin by addressing the question "Who am I, and why am I?"

What is a catechism? A catechism is a summary way of teaching what it is we believe.

The PC(USA) has three catechisms that are included in our Constitution as part of our Book of Confessions-the Heidelberg Catechism and the Shorter and Longer Westminster Catechisms. In addition, in 1998, the 210th General Assembly adopted a Study Catechism and a "first" catechism, written primarily for elementary-age children.

Here is the first question and its answer in each of our Presbyterian catechisms:

Heidelberg Catechism (1563): What is your only comfort in life and in death? That I am not my own, but belong—body and soul, in life and in death—to my faithful Savior, Jesus Christ. He has fully paid for all my sins with his precious blood, and has set me free from the tyranny of the devil. He also watches over me in such a way that not a hair can fall from my head without the will of my Father in heaven; in fact, all things must work together for my salvation. Because I belong to him, Christ, by his Holy Spirit, assures me of eternal life and makes me wholeheartedly willing and ready from now on to live for him.

Westminster Shorter Catechism (1649): What is the chief end of man? Man's chief end is to glorify God, and to enjoy him forever.

I Cor. 10:31; Rom. 11:36; Ps. 73:24-26; John 17:22, 24.

Westminster Larger Catechism (1649): What is the chief and highest end of man? Man's chief and highest end is to glorify God, and fully to enjoy him forever. Rom. 11:36; I Cor. 10:31; Ps. 73:24–26; John 17:22, 24

PC(USA) Study Catechism (1998):What is God's purpose for your life? God wills that I should live by the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, for the love of God, and in the communion of the Holy Spirit.

"The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of you." – 2 Cor. 13:13

PC(USA) Belonging to God: A First Catechism (1998): Who are you? I am a child of God.

Speaking of Trick or Treating we have challenged our teachers and their classroom to host a trunk for the church youth group's annual Trunk or Treat.


Even though the temperatures are hot the school is not cooling down. We have lots of fun and educational learning going on. We invite you to come by and visit anytime. Happy Fall.

WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY OCTOBER 1, 2023

October 1st is World Communion Sunday

As we celebrate the Lord's Supper, we are united with Christians in all times and all places around the Table. Each year, the Presbyterian Church receives an offering to support peacemaking and Christian witness around the world.

Helping to Stop Human Trafficking and the Exploitation of Children

A mere child herself, living in Madagascar, Rose had already married, given birth to and lost a child by the time she was 15. Upon discovering that she was pregnant just four months after her traditional wedding, Rose's joy at the birth of her son quickly turned to sorrow when he died after just 10 days. One agonizing month later, Rose's in-laws demanded that she move out of their home and file for separation from their son. According to their belief system and the prevailing customs in their native Madagascar, if a baby dies before it is 1 month old, it doesn't have a good mother.

Overwhelmed and despondent at having lost everything, Rose turned to Madagascar's nightclub and discotheque scene where human trafficking is rampant. It was there that the Rev. Helivao Poget (hay-lē-vah-ō) found her. Rev. Helivao and her colleague listened to Rose's story and prayed with her. Rose agreed to follow them to a safe place where she was ultimately able to turn her life around. Rev. Helivao serves as director of ministry to marginalized people at the Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar, one of Presbyterian World Mission's global partners. Thanks to her efforts and dedication, now Rose is helping to lead others out of the scourge of human trafficking. The call to end human trafficking in Madagascar and the exploitation of children everywhere is made possible, in part, by gifts to the Peace & Global Witness Offering.

Rev. Helivao is not alone in her efforts to prevent children from being exploited. She says, "PC(USA) mission co-workers work with us by visiting our activities, sharing ideas and providing materials and support. "PC(USA) regional liaisons come to see our work in the field, regularly helping us to write our projects and advising us in many other ways." Through the Peace & Global Witness Offering, we can touch lives far beyond our individual reach. It reminds us that we are not alone, that the world is a very big place, but we are in this ministry of peace and global witness, together. We are the peacemakers. When we all do a little, it adds up to a lot. Please give generously.


